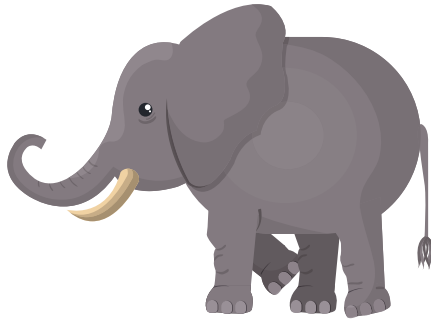
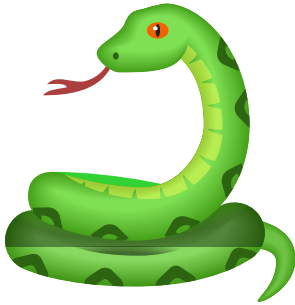


An onomatopoeia
